The Preparatory One-Year Programme is taught by Linguapolis, the language institute of the University of Antwerp. The programme allows you to acquire Dutch as a foreign language for academic contexts in just one academic year.

Linguapolis organises Dutch courses in various programmes for more than 2,500 students every year. Based on scientific research and more than **35 years of experience**, Linguapolis has developed several methods to teach languages in an effective and motivating way. If you enrol in the Prep Year, you will find yourself in a stimulating environment and you will be guided by **highly skilled teachers**.

We promise lots of **interaction** and a resultsoriented approach. In return we expect serious engagement from our students. In no more than ten months you will be able to take the Interuniversity Test for Dutch as a Foreign Language (ITNA), which serves as the final exam. By passing this test, you show that you have achieved at least level B2 of the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR).

Achieving level B2 means that you comply with the language requirements for **higher education** and can enrol in a study programme taught in Dutch at a Flemish university or university of applied sciences and arts.

2.1 The University of Antwerp

In a nutshell

The University of Antwerp has about 23,000 students, which makes it the third largest university in Flanders. 17,5% of our students are international students, covering 130 nationalities from Argentina to Zambia.

It has **9 faculties**: Applied Engineering; Arts; Business and Economics; Design Sciences; Law; Medicine and Health Sciences; Pharmaceutical, Biomedical and Veterinary Sciences; Political and Social Sciences; Science.

Is the Prep Year for me?

Learning to speak a new language at university level in just one year is quite a challenge. Not just for you, but for everyone. Because we want every participant to have a chance to succeed, we formulated the following admission and study requirements.

3.1 Target audience

If you are a **non-Dutch-speaking student**, and you want to prepare for a study programme taught in Dutch in higher education, you are welcome to participate in our Prep Year. Since its start in 2002, we have welcomed students from all over the world. The student group usually consists of people from over 25 different countries.

The Prep Year is an **intensive full-time programme** and meets the requirements for obtaining a student visa (certain conditions apply, see <u>7.2</u>). By applying, you enrol at the University of Antwerp. This means that you receive a student card and can use all of the university's facilities (library, student restaurants, sports facilities, etc.).

To make the most of the Prep Year, you have to make a few commitments.

Before coming to Belgium

To help you get off to a good start, we provide you with relevant links to websites for self-study. This allows you to start learning some Dutch at home before the start of the programme.

During the programme

The course is fast-paced, which means that you need to absorb a lot of information in a short amount of time. That is why you must be familiar with foreign language learning.

Even with an effective study method, learning a new language cannot be achieved without considerable effort. This means you need to review the course materials before and after class during self-study. We recommend at least one hour of self-study for every hour of class. You can take a studentjob, but

take into account that the programme in itself is already very intensive. Good **time management** and **organisational skills** are, therefore, **essential**.

You will also develop your Dutch language skills by practising in real-life situations. This is also why the period of online lessons for students who have not yet arrived in Belgium is limited.



3.2 Admission requirements

If you want to enrol in this programme, you must meet the following requirements in order to be admitted:

- You must have **completed secondary school successfully**. Your secondary school qualifications must be sufficient for enrolment at a university in the country where the qualifications were obtained. Read more on page 25 if you have not yet obtained the qualifications required.
- You will need to have achieved an intermediate level of knowledge of English, corresponding to level B1 in the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR). (See the table below)
- You will need to prove that you have studied English as a foreign language*. If you are a native speaker of English and/or if you attended a secondary school where the language of instruction was English, you will need to prove experience of studying another European language as a foreign language*. This can be either at school or as an extracurricular course (with a minimum of 50 hours). Our teaching method is based on the assumption that students are familiar with foreign language learning.

^{*} A foreign language is a language that is neither the student's mother tongue nor the language of instruction used at their secondary school.

3.3 Study requirements

We expect you to meet a number of study requirements.

Practical requirements

In order to use the e-learning platform properly, you must have **access to a computer** with an internet connection. A smartphone does not suffice.

Academic conditions

- You are expected to process the course materials before and after class using self-study and distance learning.
- Linguapolis does not offer any remedial teaching; neither do the teaching staff.
- We will assess the programme components separately and continuously. You will receive individual feedback.

Attendance requirements

- The Prep Year is a full-time study programme. The study load requires complete dedication to the programme.
- You are expected to attend all classes for the duration of the programme. This also applies if you start the programme online.
- If you miss a class, it is your own responsibility to catch up.
- The teachers will keep a record of students' attendance. In the event of any long-term absences that were not communicated beforehand, the student concerned may be expelled from the course. The Ministry of Foreign Affairs will be notified when student visas are involved.

Overview of the programme



Overview of the programme

One year of full-time and intensive study will help you establish and perfect your knowledge of the Dutch language. Discover what your classes and year will look like.

4.1 Programme content

The Prep Year is a full-time study programme (60 credits). It consists of **480 contact hours**. The lessons take place at the University of Antwerp's Stadscampus in the city centre.

The campus is **easily accessible** by bike or public transport. Watch this video to discover your future campus.

On average, the programme has 15 hours of daytime classes per week. It consists of a combination of **Dutch language classes** (*Language Acquisition*) and three modules which are designed to deepen your knowledge about studying in Flanders:

- Academic Study Skills;
- Dutch Phonetics and Pronunciation;
- Culture of the Low Countries.

The classes take place on campus with Dutch as the language of instruction from day one. We use English to give information at the beginning of the programme, and the Welcome Week is also in English. If there are any questions, the students can contact the teachers in English, but we encourage the use of Dutch whenever possible.






Language Acquisition is divided into five levels.

These classes help you acquire the building blocks of the Dutch language in an effective, communicative way. The lower levels focus on basic vocabulary and grammatical structures. Levels 3 and above cover more abstract vocabulary and complex grammatical structures. You can find more information about the CEFR-scale on this webpage.

At the end of each level, there is an exam. Please bear in mind that you must pass the exam at the end of each language level before you can move on to the next level. If you fail an exam, you can take

it again one week later. If you fail the exam again, you will need to repeat the level. This means that you will not be able to complete all five language levels during the programme.

The final exam after Level 5 is the Interuniversity Test of Dutch as a Foreign language (ITNA). If you pass this exam, you meet the CEFR level B2 language requirement set by universities and universities of applied sciences and arts in Flanders.





Academic Study Skills is divided into two modules.

Module 1:

In this module, there are face-to-face classes in small groups. Particular attention is paid to listening skills, by means of audio and video material taken from the learning method 'Vanzelfsprekend'. During classes, we will test your language and study skills continually. The package features all the basic language functions and structures of Dutch needed by the 'basic user' as defined in the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR). All skills are included: listening, reading, writing and speaking.

Module 2:

In addition to the key aspect of expanding and consolidating vocabulary, we also work on subcompetences such as spelling, writing skills with a specific focus on text structure, signalling words and phrasing, speaking skills, individual error correction on the basis of short presentations and listening skills with an emphasis on taking notes and studying them. Scientific texts are used.

'At the end of the language year (levels 4 and 5), you read a lot of popular science articles and listen to podcasts such as the 'Universiteit van Vlaanderen'. I also heard professors from the University of Antwerp speaking on these podcasts. I learned a lot of academic vocabulary that way. I then recognised this vocabulary in the lessons and lectures in my bachelor's programme.'

You will get face-to-face classes in small groups which cover different aspects of speaking intelligibly. In addition to correctly distinguishing and pronouncing sounds at the level of phonemes, words and sentences and in spontaneous speech, we pay particular attention to intonation, rhythm and pace.

Culture of the Low Countries (4 credits)

In this 'Culture of the Low Countries' module, you will receive information about political, cultural and social life in Flanders. You will watch short video clips taken from the learning method 'Vanzelfsprekend', texts, songs and poems. There is room for comparison with your own culture. We also pay attention to education and the opportunities you have to continue your studies in higher education.

We also give you the task of discovering the world outside the classroom. You will explore Antwerp and Ghent and are encouraged to visit museums and exhibitions. Depending on the activities available, trips to cultural events may also be organised. Finally, you are invited to sample a number of typical Flemish celebrations, such as Sinterklaas, Christmas and Easter, with your teachers.



From November onwards, you can participate in *Taalmaat*, the language buddy programme that matches Prep Year students with Dutch-speaking university students from different faculties. With *Taalmaat* you get to practise everyday Dutch with peers in informal contexts and realistic settings. The project gives you a taste of student life in Antwerp. It also a great way to prepare for your studies in Flanders.



'I chose the Dutch Preparatory Year at Linguapolis because it offers other courses than just Language Acquisition. 4.2 Timeline

The first important date for the upcoming Prep Year is 1 November 2026. From this date onward, you will be able to submit an enrolment application online.

The deadline for submitting an enrolment application is **31 August 2026**. All online enrolment applications must reach Linguapolis before that date. Please keep in mind that if you require a student visa, you must submit your complete enrolment application **before 1 March 2026**.

The programme runs for an entire academic year. It starts with a Welcome Week on 14 September 2026 and ends on 30 June 2027. This Welcome Week includes information sessions, guided tours, icebreaker games, etc. It is meant to give you a head start in Antwerp and at the university.

We strongly advise you to arrive in Antwerp at least one week before the Welcome Week starts, so you have some time to settle into your new environment. If you are not able to arrive in Belgium before the first day of the programme, due to reasons beyond your control, you will be offered the chance to start the programme online. On the condition that you attended the online classes, you can be admitted to the programme until 5 October.

If you are not able to present yourself at our secretary's office by 5 October 2026 and attend the classes on campus (e.g. if you have not yet received your student visa), you will no longer be able to participate in the programme (see chapter 6.1: Enrolment process).

There will be no classes during the following **holiday periods:**

- The Christmas holidays between 21 December 2026 and 3 January 2027
- The Easter holidays between 29 March and 11 April 2027

A second exam session will be held in September 2027 for students who did not pass the first time.

- **Before 31 August 2026:** complete your enrolment if you don't need a student visa
- 14 September 2026: start of the Prep Year

- 29 March 11 April 2027: Easter holidays
- 30 June 2027: end of the Prep Year
- September 2027: retake exam possible

5.2 Our commitments

Small groups

Our groups consist of approximately 15 to 20 students. We do this to guarantee that our teachers can take an interactive, communicative approach in which all students' needs are addressed effectively.

Qualified and experienced language teachers

All our language teachers are native speakers with master degrees in languages and teaching. They regularly participate in conferences and workshops on language teaching to keep themselves up-to-date with the most recent developments in language learning and teaching.

Active and communicative approach

Our teaching approach is communicative, interactive and task-oriented. We make sure you can continuously interact with the other students. Therefore we expect you to actively participate in class.

Through this Blackboard platform, you can independently and rewatch or re-listen audiovisual materials at your own pace, access answer keys, and complete digital vocabulary and grammar exercises. Teachers use the platform to communicate about the content of every lesson and the expected self-study. You'll also find tips to further improve your Dutch and links to useful websites. This dynamic learning environment is fully aligned with the learning goals, helping you get even more out of every class.

Accuracy and correctness



Practical information



Practical information

Read this chapter carefully to make sure your enrolment is complete and correct. We strongly advise you to gather all necessary documents in time. Practical information regarding obtaining a student visa can be found in chapter 7.

6.1 Enrolment process

For the 2026-2027 academic year, you can apply from 1 November 2025 onwards. There are seven steps to complete the enrolment process. You must submit a complete enrolment application and pay the advance fee of 2,000 euros before your application is considered.

Please be aware that, in order to obtain a student visa, you must prove your intention to enter higher education. You must first be accepted for a full-time Belgian study programme (taught in Dutch) for the 2027-2028 academic year as well (see Chapter 7: Information for students who need a student visa).

Enrolment application & advance fee

Fill out the online enrolment form in Mobility Online.

If you need a student visa, please submit your enrolment application **before 1 March 2026**. If you don't need a student visa, please submit your enrolment application **before 31 August 2026**.

In this form you will need to write down **your personal information and motivation**. You will need to upload the following documents to support the enrolment application:

- A copy of a valid passport or identity card;
- A copy of an original degree certificate with a translation into Dutch, French, German or English if the degree is in another language;
 - If you are enrolled in your final year of secondary education, you can submit a copy of an original and signed letter from your secondary school confirming that you are expected to complete the programme at the end of the current academic year. This document must also confirm that the qualification which will be obtained is sufficient to start university in the country concerned. Please also include an up-to-date transcript of recently acquired study results. These documents should be translated into Dutch, French, German or English if they are in another language.
- A copy of the original academic transcripts with a translation into Dutch, French, German or English if they are in another language;
- Proof that you have studied English as a foreign language (if not mentioned on your diploma of secondary education);
 - If your mother tongue is English, or the language of instruction in secondary school was English, you will need to submit proof of this and prove that you have studied another European language as a foreign language instead (with a minimum of 50 hours, this can be either at school or as an extracurricular course).
- Copies of other diplomas, degrees and/or certificates.

When you submit your enrolment application, you must also **pay the advance fee.** Otherwise your enrolment will not be processed or assessed. If you need a student visa, you must pay the advance fee of 2,000 euros before **15 April 2026.** If you don't need a student visa, the deadline is **31 August 2026.** We do advise paying the fee as soon as possible to ensure that your enrolment can be processed and assessed in time.

When you have completed this first step, your data and documents will be assessed. We will check your documents and the level and content of your degree(s). We will then formulate a recommendation about whether or not you should enrol in the programme. This process may take up to **4 weeks**. If the Admission Board accepts your enrolment application, you will receive an email and can proceed with step two.

It is not permitted to correspond with the Admission Board in the meantime. If you are not accepted into the programme at this stage, you will receive a refund, minus a cancellation cost of 300 euros (see Chapter 8: Rejection and refund policy).

Interview

If your enrolment is accepted by the Admission Board, you will receive an invitation for an interview.

The following **topics** will be discussed during the interview:

- Your reasons for taking the programme;
- Your knowledge of what the programme involves;
- Your level of English: we will test to see if you have achieved the minimum level required (intermediate level - CEFR B1);
- Your interest in learning Dutch and how you started exploring the language.

Of course, you will also get the opportunity to ask questions about the programme at the end of the interview.

If you fail to demonstrate sufficient motivation or understanding of the programme, or if your level of English is insufficient, your enrolment will be rejected and a refund will be issued, minus a cancellation cost of 300 euros (see Chapter 8: Rejection and refund policy). Please remember that achieving the required level of English (minimum intermediate level - CEFR B1) is your own responsibility.

We cannot give you a second chance to do the interview. At the end of the interview, we will let you know if you succeeded. The same day, you will receive confirmation via email and instructions for the next steps.

This interview takes place via a video call and will be recorded for future reference or for your identification.

Providing legalised documents

If your interview went well, you can move on to the next step: providing legalised documents. This allows us to **verify the authenticity** of the degree(s), transcripts and translations you uploaded. Please use the proper method as outlined in the document on legalisations.

- If a translation is required, it must be carried out by a sworn translator and the translation should then be legalised.
- If you have not yet obtained your secondary school diploma at the time of enrolment application, you should send us the original copy (in English, French, German or Dutch) of the official confirmation from your educational institution that you are expected to finalise your secondary education at the end of the current academic year.

Once the qualification has been obtained, a **legalised copy** must be sent to Linguapolis before the start of the programme. Unless instructed otherwise, you can send the legalised copy by post or courier to the following address:

If your documents were legalised with a digital e-legalisation, it will suffice to send the soft copies via email to prepyear@linguapolis.be. The deadline for submitting the legalised translations is **31 May 2026** for students who need a student visa, and **7 September 2026** for students that do not need a student visa.

Please take into account that the legalisation and translation of documents takes time and can be expensive. Submitted documents are never returned.

Letter of Acceptance

Steps 1, 2 and 3 will determine whether your enrolment will be accepted. If you are accepted into the programme, you will receive a personalised Letter of Acceptance from Linguapolis for the 2026-2027 academic year.

You can **download this letter from Mobility Online**, the platform you used to fill out the application form. You can only use this letter **for administrative purposes** (see Chapter 7: Information for students who need a student visa).

If your enrolment is rejected, you will be informed of the reasons for rejection.

Payment of the tuition fee

Now that you have received your personal Letter of Acceptance, you can start preparing your arrival and stay!

Before the start of the programme, you must **contact Mr Andy Vermeulen**, student administration officer at Linguapolis (see Chapter 9: Contact information). He will help you with the administrative follow-up and payment of the remaining tuition fee. You can contact him via email.

If there is suspicion of committing fraud (e.g. if someone else did the interview), you will need to do the interview again upon arrival in Belgium. If the suspicion is confirmed, you will be denied admission. In this case the advance fee will not be refunded and, if a student visa is involved, Linguapolis will inform the Belgian Immigration Office that you have not been admitted to the programme (see Chapter 8: Rejection and refund policy).

Letter of Admission

If you are accepted and have paid the remaining fee, you will receive a personalised Letter of Admission from Linguapolis that can be used for registration with the municipality.

If you stay in Antwerp for longer than three months, you must register with the municipality's Department of Foreign Affairs within 8 working days of arrival in order to obtain a **residence permit**. The student administration officer at Linguapolis, Mr Andy Vermeulen (see Chapter 9: Contact Information), can help you with the registration procedure.

WELCOME

Your arrival

We strongly advise you to arrive at least one week before the Welcome Week starts, so you have some time to settle into your new environment. If you are not able to arrive in Belgium before the first day of the programme, on 14 September 2026, due to reasons beyond your control, you will be offered the option of starting the programme online.

If you wish to start the programme **online**, you must:

- Pay the tuition fee in full before the start of the programme;
- Prove that you cannot arrive in Belgium by the start of the programme due to reasons beyond your control;
- Make every possible effort to come to Belgium as soon as possible;
- Keep the student administration officer at Linguapolis, Mr Andy Vermeulen, informed of your status.

6.2 Tuition fee

The **tuition fee** is 4,895 euros for EEA students* and 6,625 euros for non-EEA students. This fee includes all teaching materials.

Please keep in mind that 2,000 euros of the fee must be paid in advance when the enrolment application is submitted. The enrolment will not be considered until the **advance fee** has been paid.

The balance, i.e. 2,895 euros for EEA students or 4,625 euros for non-EEA students, must be paid to Linguapolis before the start of the Welcome Week, which starts on **14 September 2026**.

Until the tuition fee has been received in full by Linguapolis, admission to the programme is not complete and the Letter of Admission and student card will not be issued.

When transferring the fees, please include the name of the student in the reference field. Note that the party making the transfer is liable for all bank transfer costs.



* **EEA students** are students who are citizens of a member state of the European Economic Area (EEA) (or those of a different nationality who have permanent residence status in Belgium, according to the categories of Art. II.215 of the Higher Education Codex).

If you want to enter higher education in Flanders, you have several options. In this chapter you discover what your options are: from bachelor or master programmes to undergraduate programmes. You also find out more about the procedure of obtaining a student visa.

7.1 How do I enter higher education in Flanders?

Enrolment at University of Antwerp

If you want to apply for a bachelor or master programme at the University of Antwerp in the 2027-2028 academic year, you should first enrol at this webpage.

If a certain level of Dutch is required in order to be admitted to the programme, you will be forwarded to a sub-form for the Preparatory One-Year Programme 2026-2027. It is not necessary to submit a second (separate) enrolment application for the Dutch language programme.

For more information about enrolment at the University of Antwerp for the 2027-2028 academic year, candidates are advised to contact the Helpdesk for International Students.

If a certain level of Dutch is required in order to be admitted to the programme, you will be forwarded to a sub-form for the Preparatory One-Year Programme 2026-2027. It is not necessary to submit a second (separate) enrolment application for the Dutch language programme.

7.2 How do I obtain a student visa?

First and foremost, be aware that obtaining a visa takes time. We strongly advise you to **start the visa procedure as early as possible.** This procedure is your own responsibility; we cannot assist.


In order to obtain a visa, you must prove your **intention to enter higher education.** This means that you must enrol in a full-time study programme taught in Dutch in Flanders for the 2027-2028 academic year.

You need to submit **two Letters of Acceptance**:

 One for the Preparatory One-Year Programme: Dutch as a Foreign Language in an Academic Context for the 2026-2027 academic year (to be submitted by Linguapolis) and; • One for the (under) graduate degree you intend to start in the 2027-2028 academic year (to be submitted by the Flemish university or university of applied sciences and arts in question).

After having received both Letters of Acceptance (one from Linguapolis for 2026-2027 and one from the institute organising the (under) graduate degree starting in the 2027-2028 academic year) you can start the procedure for obtaining a student visa.

Rejection and refund policy



Rejection and refund policy

Whether or not you can get a refund depends on when you cancel your enrolment. Please read the conditions below carefully.

During the enrolment process

During the enrolment process, the advance fee of 2,000 euros minus 300 euros cancellation costs will be refunded if the enrolment is rejected due to one or more of the following reasons:

- You haven't provided some of the required information;
- You don't have the minimum qualifications;
- Your level of English is insufficient;
- You have not studied any other European languages (if you are a native speaker of English and/orifyou attended a secondary school where the language of instruction was English);
- You fail to demonstrate sufficient motivation or understanding of the programme.

If the information provided on your enrolment application is misleading, incorrect, misrepresented or fraudulent, the advance fee of 2,000 euros will not be refunded.

After the Letter of Acceptance has been issued

After the Letter of Acceptance has been issued, refunds can only be made if you are unable to obtain a temporary residence visa for students.

You will need an official document from the embassy as proof. This official document needs to be submitted **before 1 November 2026**, after which the advance fee of 2,000 euros will be refunded minus 300 euros for cancellation costs. The advance fee will not be refunded if we have not received this official document before 1 November 2026.

If you request a refund for any other reason, and if you support the request with official documents, Linguapolis will make a decision in good faith. We will automatically inform the **Belgian Immigration Office** whenever a student who was initially accepted cannot be admitted to the programme.

When you have already arrived in Antwerp

When you arrive in Antwerp, it is possible that your level of English might be tested again. If fraud is detected, you will be denied admission to the programme. In this case, the advance fee of 2,000 euros will not be refunded.

Please note that, if a student visa is involved, we will inform the **Belgian Immigration Office** that you have not been admitted to the programme.

Once the programme has started

After the first day of the academic year, 21 September 2026, no refunds are possible. There is only one exception to this rule.

If you start the programme online and if you are unable to come to Belgium in time to participate in the lessons, we will refund part of the tuition fee:

- 3,670 euros for EEA students
- 4,950 euros for non-EEA students

The following conditions must be met:

- You started the programme online because you were unable to come to Belgium by 14 September 2026 due to reasons beyond your control;
- You have official proof that you were unable to come to Belgium in order to present yourself at our secretary's office by 5 October 2026 due to reasons beyond your control.

If you do not meet these conditions, or if you have already started attending the programme in Antwerp, you will not be entitled to a refund.

Please keep in mind that all bank transfer costs must be paid by you.


