





## **Disruption**

- Screening services were formally 'paused' in Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland in March 2020
- Effectively paused in England as invitations were not sent out from screening hubs.
- Many screening units began sending out invitations again in July 2020.
- In a 31<sup>st</sup> July letter to NHS Trusts the NHS Chief Executive Sir Simon Stevens set out the NHS priorities for the rest of 2020/21.
  - top priority from August 2020 was to restart screening in full


## Cervical cancer screening

- In England, invitations for screening were suspended between the beginning of April 2020 and the beginning of June 2020
- Primary care providers were given the option to delay invitation for screening for up to six months if necessary
- Upon resumption those women on Early Recall were invited first during the month of June.
  - Thereafter women on routine recall were sent invitations
  - Both those affected by COVID and those due from June onwards
- Secondary care
  - No disruption to high-grade referrals
  - Minor disruptions to low-grade referrals

## **Impact**

### Cervical cancer screening

- Roughly 750,000 women affected over three months of disruption
  - Samples received at laboratories are roughly at the usual level
- Estimating impact is complicated
  - Public awareness campaign ran in 2019 on exactly the months of disruption and
  - HPV primary testing was rolled out just prior to the disruption



• Biggest challenge will be 'consumer' and provider confidence
