Background

- trust in immunisation in general very high
- just coming out of third lockdown
- school closures
 - 20th March 2020 some back in June full return in September 2020
 - 5th January 2021- return 8th March 2021
- supportive media
- important to maintain the routine programme
- impact of other vaccine programmes

- school immunisation teams
- girls since 2008
- MSM since 2018
- boys since 2019
- currently offering Gardasil 4
- large portfolio of supportive resources
- vaccine delivered through
 - schools
 - HIV and GUM clinics
 - primary care (for 'catch up')



JCVI advice 20 October 2020

The committee advises that the priority for the delivery of the routine HPV immunisation programme is for all eligible children to receive at least the first dose of the HPV vaccine. This includes prioritising the catch up of those who failed to get the first dose due to school closures. Evidence strongly indicates that one dose of HPV vaccine will provide protection in the short to medium term.

The committee considers that the interval between the first and second dose can be extended by a number of years without compromising protection or the boosting effect of the second dose. Delivery or catch up of the second dose should be considered at the appropriate time, for example alongside the teenage boosters, when circumstances support this according to local planning of immunisation services.

Impact of the pandemic

- 64.7% of Year 9 females completed the 2-dose HPV vaccination course in 2019/20, compared with 83.9% in 2018/19.
- HPV vaccine coverage for the priming dose in 2019/20 was 59.2% in Year 8 females (compared with 88.0% in 2018/19) and 54.4% in Year 8 males
- this aligns with other adolescent vaccinations and that boys data not wildly different than that for girls
- likely to be an underestimate as not captured all 'recovery' activity








Recovery

- NHS school-aged providers have been asked to catch up outstanding HPV doses and most remain on track to ensure recovery of HPV school aged programmes by the 31 August 2021.
- NHS school-aged providers were asked to ensure those eligible had the first dose of HPV (and any other missed vaccines where relevant) before offering the second dose of HPV, as per JCVI guidance
- NHS England and Improvement have reinforced governance structures to support regions to deliver missed vaccinations as soon as possible
- fortnightly National Immunisation Network teleconferences

Maintaining vaccine uptake during the pandemic

In the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic which has seen us all have to adapt to working in new ways to keep ourselves and those around us safe, we would like to express our admiration to all of the immunisations teams across the country who have risen to the challenge of ensuring vaccinations go ahead.





We would like to highlight the work of the School Aged Immunisation Service from Derbyshire Community Health Services NHS FT have had to think outside the box to ensure the children of Derbyshire and Derby City were still able to be vaccinated despite the school closures.

They have been running "drive-thru" clinics throughout the County and City, using partnership working with schools,

local authority and community spaces. The team have had to brave wind, torrential rain and 30°c+ heat. In the wind the gazebos were dismantled, in the rain wellington boots and ponchos became part of our PPE and in the sun some lovely parents provided ice creams!

It has been a very different way of working but it has been doe with smiles on our faces (atthough hidden by masks) and knowing that the children in our cohort are continuing to be protected in an unsettling time. At the beginning of July we had vaccinated over 5000 children with more venues operating throughout the summer.

Vaccine update

HPV for all

The UK HPV immunisation programme is one of the most successful around the world, continuing to achieve high coverage with millions of doses of vaccine given to girls in the UK since its launch in 2008.

From September 2019 the HPV immunisation programme was expanded to a universal programme with 12-13 year old boys becoming eligible alongside 12-13 years old girls in school year 8, and 13-14 year old girls in school year 9 across England.

Vaccine coverage estimates for the 2019 to 2020 academic year have been published in the most recent annual report at weblink 15.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, all educational settings were closed from 23 March 2020 (with the last day of school on

20 March 2020) and the delivery of all school immunisation programmes were interrupted.

As a result, uptake of the HPV vaccines has been significantly impacted. Latest UK vaccine coverage figures for children up to five years of age published
