

In this competition, students learn how to operate with EU regulations and international treaties that apply across different jurisdictions and should ideally receive a uniform interpretation.

The Moot Court consists of two phases, a written and an oral one.

Teams are given a case geared towards Private International Law questions (jurisdiction, choice of law or recognition and enforcement issues), and students have the opportunity to learn and apply first-hand the complexities and nuances of how international conventions and EU Regulations interact in the context of transnational litigation.

Private International Law is the set of legal principles and rules that leads to the applicable law in international civil and commercial cases, allocates jurisdiction, and regulates the recognition and enforcement of foreign judgments.

This field of law is often the foreground of significant multinational legal disputes, where sometimes the entire case hinges on which court has jurisdiction, which law applies or the cross-border effects of judgments.

In the oral phase, Moot teams plead before renowned judges, academics, and practicing lawyers in Private International Law.
