Instructions RDC Florence, 29-31 October 2018

You will have four roles during the seminar: presenter, commentator, chair and reporter.

Presenter

You will have 10-15 minutes to present your research. You can use Powerpoint if you want. The time for presentations is deliberately kept short to allow for enough time for discussion. Furthermore, you have to read the papers of the other presenters in your group so everyone should be familiar with the material. The presentation can function as a way to highlight the most important points, or questions you would like to discuss. Furthermore, the senior commentators will likely not have read many papers besides the ones they will comment on, so it is advisable to present your work in a way that is understandable to them too. Please note that an average person speaks about 150 words/min, so if you write your text out, you should aim for 1500 words. (Also note that this is not an invitation to read out your text. Rather, you are advised to practice your presentation to make sure it stays within the time constraints - the chairperson will see to this.)

Peer commentator

Every participant prepares an in-depth commentary on one of the papers of your fellow PhD students. After the presentation of the paper you will present your comments to the group within a time-slot of **5-10 minutes**. As a commentator it is unlikely that you are an expert in the field under discussion, so logically you will have more to say on general points about the argumentation, scientific relevance, methodology or feasibility of the presented project. You are kindly invited to develop your comments in a systemic manner and email a copy to Bram Hoonhout afterwards, who will collect and upload the comments so you can review them later.

Please note that as a commentator you don't have to prove that you are smarter than the presenter (as some people do at these occasions). You are invited to identify points for improvement, but in a constructive manner—we are all there to learn from others in the community.

Senior commentator

After the peer commentator, the senior commentator will comment for 10-15 minutes. Please note that this person will not necessarily be an expert in your particular niche, but rather someone who has broader experience of the field of social/economic history, i.e. someone who could be in your defence committee. We will ask the senior commentator to put her/his comments on paper, so you can review them afterwards and discuss them with your advisors.

Chair

After the senior commentator, the floor is open for discussion. Therefore, it is important you have read all the papers of those in your group and prepared at least one question for each paper. Furthermore, in order to practice approved forms of scientific discussion, each presentation will be chaired by one PhD student. She or he will introduce the speaker and give information about his or her affiliation and topic of the project. After the presentation, the chair makes sure that the discussion will run smoothly, with proper roles for the commentator and all other participants. You might want to prepare a question or comment yourself to jump-start the discussion.

The chair is also responsible to uphold the time schedule, so please make sure the commentators don't go overboard with their allotted time. For example, if the senior commentator gets too excited to stop, you should intervene and kindly suggest they can continue the discussion afterwards, and open the floor to allow others to speak as well.

Reporter

Every PhD candidate is asked to write a report of the discussion during one of the sessions. Try to capture the most important points and questions that are raised during the discussion. This will give the presenter room to only focus on the debate (rather than furiously trying to write everything down) while the reporter is trained in close listening and reporting.

To reach the Hotel from Florence Airport, take the airport shuttle (Linea Volainbus) to the Autostazione SITA next to Florence railway station (Santa Maria Novella). If you are coming from Pisa or Bologna airport, you may simply travel by train to Florence (railway station Santa Maria Novella), and then follow the below instructions. From Pisa there are busses to Florence as well, but the option of PisaMover shuttle (to Pisa Centrale) + train is more reliable. Tickets can be bought at the airport.

From the train station take bus 11, 6, 11, 14, 17, 23 to Piazza San Marco. From Piazza San Marco take the bus n. 7 (direction "FIESOLE"), run by the ATAF local transport company and get off at the stop "DI SAN DOMENICO 07". From here, after crossing the main road, enter the small street uphill Via Jacopone da Todi, 12
